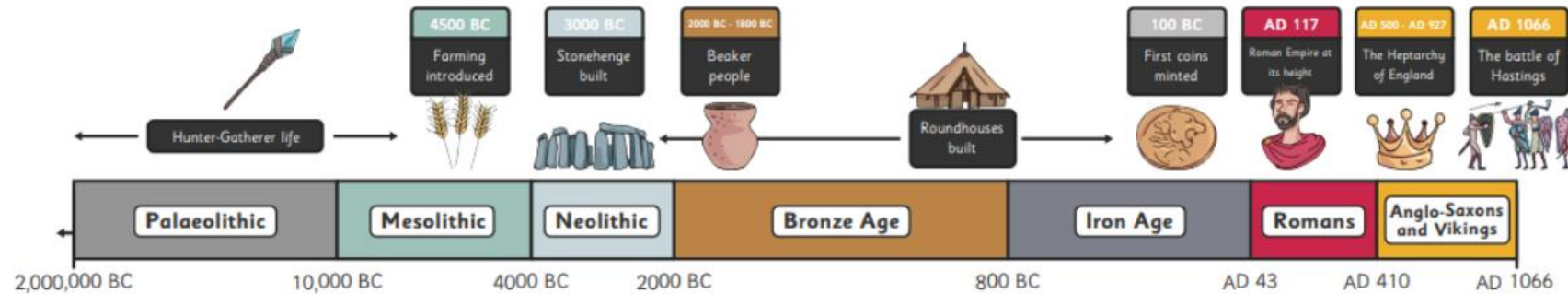

How did the Romans shape modern Britain? 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> 55BC - The first invasion of Britain (led by Julius Caesar). AD43 - The Emperor Claudius invaded Britain. There were many tribes of Celts, including the Iceni Tribe and the Picts from Caledonia (Scotland). The Iceni Tribe was led by a woman called Boudicca. AD60-61, Boudicca destroyed Roman Verulamium in St Albans. Verulamium was a large Roman town with a hypocaust, an underfloor heating system. Boudicca led the rebellion against the Roman army in AD60 and lost. Boudicca may have poisoned herself in shame or so that her enemies did not capture her. AD410 The Romans leave Britain and return to Italy. 		ancient	Belonging to the distant past, especially to the period in history before the end of the Roman Empire (AD 410).
