being careful with questions





When children are still learning new words, the most helpful thing we can do is to show them what these words are as we play and do different things throughout the day. It is tempting to ask children questions to find out what they know, but if we don't tell them what these words are, they won't know them.

You might find it useful to think about our 'rule of thumb' as you focus on using more comments than questions — for every question you ask, try and follow it up with four comments before asking your next question.



Comment about things in everyday life that interest your child. Instead of asking, "What are you making?" as your child squeezes some play dough, comment on what he's doing, such as, "Oh, you're squeezing the play dough". Instead of asking "What's that?" while your child looks at a picture of a giraffe in a book, you could comment "That's a tall giraffe!".

If a question comes into your head, like "what colour is the giraffe?", change it into a comment, "the giraffe is yellow and brown". Try and match what you say to your child's language stage. If they are only using a few words, comment with just a few words, if they are saying lots of words together, you can say a longer comment, like "The giraffe is dancing beautifully!"



When your child is building with blocks try saying...
"1 brick, 2 bricks, 3 bricks... it's getting taller... wobble wobble... I wonder how tall it's going to get... they're all red... next a green one... how many are there now?... it looks like it's going to fall... oh no! All fall down."
